words that end in silent -e:

 when adding an ending (suffix) that begins with a vowel (-ing), drop the silent -e

make-making explore-exploring

 when the ending (suffix) begins with a consonant (-s), keep the -e

make—makes explore—explores

Spelling Rules

<u>"i" before "e"</u>:

• write *i* before e, except after *c* or when sounded

like -ay as in neighbor or weigh

believe achieve

Spelling Rules

letter q:

 in English words, the letter q is always followed by u

quack queen quick

Spelling Rules

letter v:

• English words do not end with the letter v

live gave dove

Spelling Rules

one-syllable word endings:

• when a one-syllable word ends with a short vowel

and has a single consonant, you double the final

consonant before adding the suffix

run-running hit-hitting

Spelling Rules

two-syllable word endings:

 in a two-syllable word, you double the final consonant if the word is accented on the last syllable

<u>ó</u>pen-opening be<u>gí</u>n-beginning

Spelling Rules

words that end with a consonant and -y:

- change the -y to an "i" then add the ending (suffix) merry-merrily
 - Ø if the suffix begins with "i", keep the -y hurry-hurrying

Spelling Rules

words that end with a vowel and -y:

• if a word that ends with a vowel and -y, do not

change the -y to an "i"

say-saying

Spelling Rules
